### Lobby Meetings-highlights

### With Senator Murray's staffers Jason Edwards and Lila Englander Nov. 6

### On BIG WIRE Act 1st ask:

**Edwards**—"So far it's not getting much opposition, but the Devil's in the details. It gives lots of flexibility to the **FERC** (**Federal Energy Regulation Commission**), just a very broad directive to "increase sharing between regions to 30%." For the **North Grid** region, including WA, there's a hitch—the **Bonneville Power Administration** covering that area owns so much of the energy and the **FERC** is very wary of using their authority over the **BPA**. A very big open question is "who is has to pay?" Rate payers will cover the costs, so it's being discussed with utilities, etc.

### RISEE Act 2nd ask:

**Edwards**—It is on our radar, but off-shore wind projects represent a problem for coastal tribes with impacts on species that they hunt. We need to get the tribes in the room and research these impacts.

### With Rep Derek Kilmer and staffer Marie Fiori Nov. 7

### Asking him to co-sponsor the BIG WIRES Act:

Kilmer—"I think it's a legitimate problem statement; if we're going to get serious about getting to the emission reductions laid out in the IRA, cracking the code on transmission is going to be important. This bill just got introduced, so we haven't had a chance to do full due diligence on it, so give us a little time to look into it. I want to be sure to talk to the Sub-committee staff on Energy and Water in Appropriations and make sure we have a full understanding of what's being proposed and the implications of what's being proposed."

He or a district team staffer will attend the **Tacoma Sustainability Expo** and the **Electrification Fair** on **Bainbridge Island** next spring.

**Kilmer**—"You guys do such important work. I am grateful to consider you partners. We are in the appropriations battle trying to protect funding for the **IRA** and the **EPA**, fighting hard to protect these priorities that we hold dear and know you do too."

### Tacoma Urban Forest Friends (TUFF)

### **Debra Grady**

We are concerned about preserving the existing tree canopy in Tacoma in an effort towards the city's goal of reaching 30% canopy by 2030 which has not budged from 20% since the goal was introduced a decade ago. Tacoma has the smallest canopy of all cities in western Washington. Tree planting efforts are wonderful, but it will take decades for those newly planted trees to reach their capacity, so we want to preserve what we have. Currently, and unlike other WA cities, Tacoma has no preservation plan or any meaningful enforcement for preserving existing trees. The **Tacoma City Council** is reviewing a new proposal to put some of these measures in place, but it needs citizen support and input to make it a robust and meaningful plan.
